14th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When children are very young, say around two or three years of age, their entire world exists within the walls of their home. And all that they are, all they believe, comes from their parents. In fact, in those young eyes, their parents are perfect; they believe everything Mom and Dad tell them is the truth, and they will do anything they ask (usually!). But as they grow older, and the world outside of those walls grows louder, the perfections of Mom and Dad seem to begin to falter. They are looked at through doubtful eyes, their wisdom challenged at nearly every turn. Often it is not until years later that we realize they were the same wise parents all along.

When Jesus entered Jerusalem for the last time before His crucifixion, He cried. Not for His fate, but because those around Him did not realize of their impending salvation. In today's Gospel, Jesus has returned to Nazareth to teach in the synagogue, yet His own people doubt His truth, remembering Him as a boy and as the son of a carpenter. He remarks that prophets such as Him are always scorned by those who know them best, the people of their hometown.

As children, our innocent faith and belief in God is unwavering. As we grow older, we sometimes question our beliefs and put aside our faith, rather than grow even closer to Christ. This is because "Faith seeks understanding" (CCC 158). Everything else in this world is explained visually through tangible facts; only faith can come from our hearts. Perhaps Jesus cried not only for those who saw His miracles yet did not

believe, but also for us who did not see. Our challenge is to be as children in our faith, unwavering, open and believing

Aching shoulders

When you see a need, prayerfully consider whether it's yours to fill. When leading the Israelites through the desert, Moses felt responsible for mediating disputes. The long lines of unhappy people soon exhausted him. Moses' father-in-law told him that by taking the whole job upon his shoulders, he was denying others the chance to serve God, too.

Second chances

Don't give up if you feel you failed to please God.
Remember St. Peter. Although he deserted Jesus when he was most needed,
Jesus gave him another chance to affirm his love (John 20:19). He will do the same for you.

Twenty easy ways to show love

"I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:34-35).

Try some of these simple ways to show love:

- Let someone else go ahead of you in line.
- Call someone who was absent from work or a social gathering and tell him he was missed.
- Resist the urge to talk negatively about someone.
- Find something good in everyone.
- Always give a second chance.
- Ask "How are you?" and listen to the answer.
- Go an entire day without raising your voice in anger.

- Help someone carry a burden.
- Listen patiently. Don't interrupt or correct.
- Make others feel welcome.
 - Offer a sincere compliment each day.
 - Pat someone on the back and smile at her.
 - Praise others when you notice their success.

- Write a "thank you" note when someone does a favor for you.

Why do Catholics pray?

Reevaluate your role. Being a godparent doesn't stop at the Baptism celebration. It is a lifelong commitment. Remember to stay active into your godchild's adulthood.

Jesus' fame spread because of the healings and other signs he performed. People came from all over hoping to share in the material benefits he offered. By feeding them, he met their physical need, but then also

himself.

The crowd was so awed by the miracles he performed, they wanted to make Jesus


king. They thought that the miracles were proof that he was the "Prophet, the one who is to come into the world," as foretold in Deuteronomy 18:15, 18.

After all, the great prophet Moses fed the people with manna and Jesus used bread. But Jesus wasn't fooled by their enthusiasm and left quickly. He doesn't want merely enthusiasm from his followers. He wants faith.

The raw material for this miracle was provided by a boy – an

> choosing him, though, Jesus showed that nobody is insignificant when it comes to proclaiming

the gospel. So, what bread or fish can you offer to God? If you have true faith, whatever you offer just might become a miracle, too.





July 2 - St. Thomas (1st century). Known as "doubting Thomas" for requesting proof of the Resurrection, he made a beautiful profession of faith when he faced the truth (John 11:16). Tradition says that Thomas evangelized the Parthians, Medes, and Persians and India. He was martyred at Calamine.

July 6 - St. Maria Goretti (1902). Twelve year-old Maria was afraid of her neighbor but kept silent for fear of causing trouble for his family. One day, while alone, Maria was attacked by the neighbor who had evil intent toward her. He stabbed her when she

wouldn't submit. Still, she forgave him before she died just hours later. Her attacker dreamed of Maria while he was in prison and repented. His first act when released 30 years later, was to beg her mother's forgiveness. He attended and wept tears of joy at Maria's canonization.

July 26 - St. Joachim and St. Anne (?). Little is known about Jesus' grandparents, but we know Mary was raised in a devout home. Her unshakeable faith, her devotion to the laws of her religion, and her steadiness in moments of crisis indicate the values with which she was raised.



One good way to be sure you can explain what you believe is to have solid information at your fingertips.

> Visitor books (www.osv.com, 800-348-2440). Or, ask your priest for a Church-approved recommendation.

Keep a copy of the Catechism of the Catholic Church handy. It summarizes what we believe and why, with an excellent glossary to help navigate. Your

library may have one or you can buy it from the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (www.usccb.org, 800-235-8722).

Start a record. Write down the answers to common questions you have been asked or wonder about yourself. Keep them in one place, like a notebook or on note cards, so you can refer to them often.

Don't forget to rely on the Holy Spirit. In fact, next time you are asked a tough question, let the Spirit do the talking.

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
