From the Desk of Father John

Continuation of *10 Things That Make for a Great Catholic Mom*:

Go against the grain (Joshua 24:15). As unpopular as it may be, great Catholic moms know that sometimes we need to say “no” when everyday culture says “yes.” Just because something is popular doesn’t make it right or good for the growth of our children. Movies with graphic violence contribute to a culture of violence. Song lyrics that demean women or other races contradict the message of Christ to “love one another.” Of course, our kids are going to participate in the culture around them, but it is our job as parents to help mediate the meaning and value of that culture in the context of our Catholic Christian faith. *Do I have the courage to say “no” to something that I believe is not age-appropriate or good for my kids? How might I seek out support and help with these decisions?*

Let go (Proverbs 22:6). The hardest and most heart-wrenching task of motherhood is letting our children go. The bond of motherhood is so deep that it is tempting to hold on to our babies long after they have grown. And yet we believe that our children are a gift from God who will one day be sent into the world to be a gift to others. It is helpful to remember that the goal of motherhood is not to smother our children with attention; rather it is to prepare them to be happy, healthy, faith-filled individuals. At times this may mean stepping back and allowing our kids to face the consequences of their actions or encouraging them to sort out a school homework assignment on their own. Sometimes letting go is the best love we can give. *How might I help my kids to learn to “stand on their own two feet”?*

Admit imperfections (James 5:16). None of us is perfect, and nowhere is this more evident than in motherhood. Even the best moms lose their tempers, make mistakes, and run out of patience. And we all feel guilty for doing so! Yet if we allow ourselves to be fully human rather than trying to live up to some unrealistic standard of perfection, we are able to parent with a greater sense of understanding, forgiveness, and compassion. Acknowledging our mistakes and imperfections – to our children, our spouse, even our neighbors or coworkers – help us remember that we’re all in need of Christ’s redemption. We are all sinners. We are all just trying to do the best we can. *Have I made a mothering mistake recently? Can I forgive myself for being an “imperfect” mom?*

You are invited to participate in lectionary based Scripture study each Wednesday, 6:30 – 7:45 p.m. at Mary’s House. We are using the Small Christian Communities format which includes prayer, music, reflection on the upcoming Sunday scripture readings, conversation in response to questions designed to help connect faith & life, & suggestions for action in response to how God calls us individually & as a community through the gospel proclaimed. We are then sent forth with a simple prayer ritual to recommit ourselves to be church for the sake of the world.

5th Sunday of Easter

One of the great lines of the Bible, and one of its most important theological concepts, appears in today’s second reading from the Book of Revelation. The author testifies that he hears the One who sits on the throne say: “Behold, I make all things new” (Rev 21:5). Recall that when Revelation was being written, the church was undergoing persecution. Those Christians familiar with Jewish writings (what we Christians call the Old Testament today) looked

to the past to seek out the ways that God had acted before. They found resonance in the oracles of deutero-Isaiah, who promised a Messiah after the leaders of Israel had been taken to captivity in Babylon. In chapter 43 of Isaiah, God proclaims that He will restore Israel, He will do something new by rebuilding the city of Jerusalem.

Jerusalem becomes symbolic of the eternal dwelling of God's chosen people. It is the place of peace and contentment. It is God's dwelling to which every nation on earth comes to dwell. And so it is no surprise when the writer of Revelation proclaims to the persecuted Christian community (who saw themselves as God's new chosen people, enduring trials just like the Hebrews of long ago) that a new Jerusalem is coming down out of heaven as a dwelling place for God and His people.

This promise of hope in a time of persecution is meant to encourage those who may be tempted to falter. In our own day, so many of us have been battered by difficult times. Each of us may have our own tale of woe. The Gospel for today reminds us that Jesus gave us a new commandment: to love one another. No matter how difficult things may be, that commandment endures. It also gives us hope, for we are united in love.

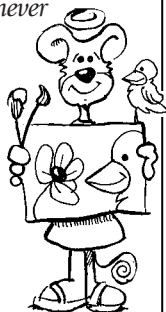
Newest Catholics

Turn to Mary

age but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and pleasing and perfect" (Romans 12:1).

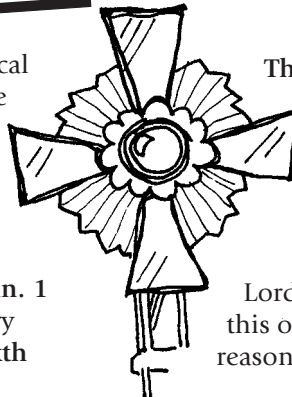


Why Do Catholics Do That?

What are Holy Days of Obligation?



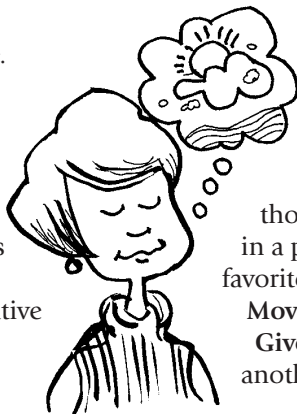
Thursday after Easter – the Ascension; **Aug. 15** – the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary; **Nov. 1** – All Saints Day; **Dec. 8** – the Immaculate Conception;

Dec. 25 – the Nativity of Our Lord. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation without a serious reason commit a grave sin.

One way to avoid sin: stop negative thoughts

If it's one thing Catholics know about, it's hope. God's love for us and his infinite mercy give us hope. Living in an imperfect world, however, can overshadow hope with doubt, fear, depression, anger, jealousy and all manner of negative thinking. Without hope, though, we can drift far from God and the path to Heaven. Try these ideas to resist negative thinking and hold onto hope.

Stay alert. Be watchful for the first signs of negative thoughts so you can crush them before they can take root.



Shake it loose. Do something to disrupt the negative image or thought. Snap a rubber band on your wrist, picture a brick wall, say, "STOP" out loud.

Replace it. Instead of dwelling on the negative thought, replace it with a prayer, an image of yourself in a peaceful place, or the face of Jesus, Mary, or your favorite saint.

Move on. Resume normal activities as soon as possible.

Give thanks. Thank God that he always gives us another chance to get things right.

from Scripture

John 20:19-23, Open your door to Christ.

Despite hearing that Jesus was being spotted around town, the disciples were shocked to see Jesus appear to them in a locked room. They thought the lock would keep everyone out. Jesus appeared to them so that they could be first-person witnesses to his resurrection. But he also came to commission them to carry on the work he started.



The work is why they were chosen, but Jesus knew they needed strength.

So he breathed on them, just as God breathed life into Adam and created a new creature. By doing so, Jesus renewed his disciples, strengthened them, and gave them a new outlook so they could continue his mission.

By virtue of our Baptism Jesus has commissioned each us to spread the word of God's love and the hope of salvation. And he promises to be with us and give us the strength we need to do his work.

Q & A Do I have an obligation to point out the sins of others?

One way Catholics can live as Jesus' disciples is to practice works of mercy. Acting out of Christian love, we can



help our neighbor obtain what is needed for spiritual and physical well-being. Corporal works address physical needs while spiritual works build up the soul.

In fact, one of the seven spiritual works is to convert the sinner.

"Brothers, even if a person is caught in some transgression, you who are spiritual should correct that one in a gentle spirit ..." (Galatians 6:1). When we notice someone acting in a sinful or hurtful way, we have a responsibility to speak up and act for change.

However, any kind of correction has to come out of love for the other person and have a basis in Scripture. *"... He should know that whoever brings back a sinner from the error of his way will save his soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins"* (James 5:20).

Feasts & Celebrations

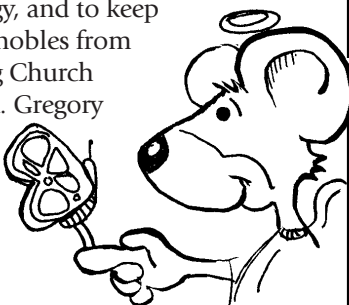
May 1 – St. Joseph the Worker. St. Joseph was a carpenter dedicated to his family, the Blessed Mother and Jesus, and obedient to God.

May 13 - Ascension of the Lord. This solemnity marks Jesus' triumphant entry into Heaven. *Note: In some dioceses, observance of Ascension has been moved to the following Sunday.*

May 18 – Pope St. John I (526). Arian heresy was troubling the Church and Arians were under attack by Emperor Justin of Constantinople. The Arian king asked Pope John I to advocate for them to Justin, which

made the emperor suspect the pope's loyalties. He had Pope John I imprisoned for conspiracy and the pope died from the treatment he received.

May 25 – Pope St. Gregory VII (1085). During dark days for the Church, St. Gregory worked to eliminate the buying and selling of sacred offices, unlawful marriages of the clergy, and to keep kings and nobles from appointing Church officials. St. Gregory vigorously defended the authority of the Church.
