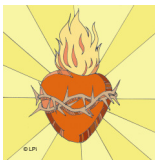

**Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ**



We sometimes go to extraordinary lengths to preserve life. Consider all the interventions that exist in a modern hospital's emergency room: from defibrillators to ventilators, from medicines that instantly negate the effects of an opiate over-dose, to drugs that can break up a clot even as a stroke is underway. All of these intricate responses have been devised over and above the more ordinary actions of orange juice to revive a diabetic or caesarian section to deliver a baby in a compromised pregnancy. Because modern medicine can do so much, many of us in the developed world live with the expectation that our lives will just keep going on. The progress of medicine has made it inevitable that many families now confront the decision of when to let someone go - ending treatment, stopping medication, removing machines.

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus promises that whoever eats His flesh and drinks His blood has eternal life. He tells the crowds that whoever eats the bread that comes down from heaven will live forever. The body and blood of Christ is real food and real drink. It is medicine for our body and soul. It is nourishment for our lives.

When Jesus makes the promise of life forever to those who eat His flesh and drink His blood, He is not talking about the kind of life support that we associate with hospital care. He is instead indicating that those who eat His body and drink His blood will live eternally because of the life that He gives. The medicine of the Eucharist heals us from sin and division, and makes us whole in Christ uniting us in one communion of love. So when we think about the extraordinary lengths we undertake to



preserve life in the natural world, we may want to reconsider what we are willing to do in the spiritual world. Is the Eucharist part of our spiritual health care regularly?

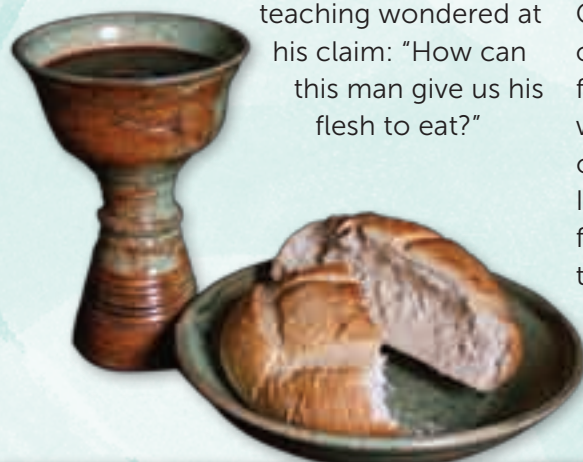

## For What Do You Hunger?

The three readings for this Sunday have a distinct Eucharistic theme. Each provides us food for thought concerning the Eucharistic meal we share at Mass and a chance to reflect on the many hungers that fill our lives.

In the Gospel reading (John 6:51–58), Jesus proclaims that he is the bread of life who has come down from heaven. Those who desire salvation must first eat of his flesh and drink of his blood. John recalls that those who heard this

teaching wondered at his claim: "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?"



In the reading from First Corinthians 10:16–17, Paul—in answer to questions from the Christian community in Corinth—writes that the cup of blessing used during their worship was more than just a cup of wine from an ancient Jewish ritual. It was something more: drinking from the cup was an actual "sharing in the blood of Christ," and eating the bread during the meal was now a "sharing in the body of Christ."

This reading, which predates the Gospel of John by nearly 40 years, is one of the earliest references to the Eucharist found in the Bible. (1 Corinthians was written in about A.D. 56 and the Gospel of John was written around A.D. 95.) It establishes the Church's early, yet firm, belief in the Real Presence: That the Eucharistic bread and wine actually become the Body and Blood of Christ. And, as Saint Paul writes, it is in the eating of this one bread that we all become one in the Body of Christ.



## The Faith of the Church

The Holy Spirit makes Christ present when God's word is proclaimed during the Mass, in the person of the priest, and in a totally unique manner through the Eucharist itself. The presence is called "real" because it is Christ's presence in the fullest sense possible. Through this presence, Christ—at the same time both God and man—are substantially present with us (Cf. *United States Catholic Catechism for Adults*, pages 223–224).



## Questions of the Week

In the Eucharist, we are fed with Christ's Body and Blood. In the sacred meal that is the Mass, we are nourished with heavenly food in order that we might live more fully as Christ's disciples each day.

### Adults

*What is one thing that I can do this week to make Christ present to others so that they experience him through my words and actions?*

### Children

*What is one thing that I can do this week to make my participation during Mass more meaningful to me and to my friends?*

## Responding to God's Word . . .

The reading from Deuteronomy 8 raises the question of how human frailty can prevent us from recognizing and responding to God. In what ways do we wander in the wilderness because we are too proud to let God lead us to happiness? How often do we eat at the Eucharistic table without understanding that we live not on bread, but on the Word of God?

Sharing in Christ's Body and Blood should be a humbling experience for us. The Eucharist is God's free gift to us. There is nothing we can do to earn it. So what reasons could

we have for pride or, even worse, indifference?

The next time that you receive the Eucharist, take some time to think about all of the good things that God has done for you throughout your life, and give thanks for God's great goodness. Then, think about what God has in store for you to do. How are you called to love and serve God and your neighbor now that you've eaten of the Heavenly meal?

In the Eucharist, we become one with Christ. We are called to share him with the world in all we do and say.

## SUGGESTIONS

Use one of these suggestions or one of your own to respond to God's Word this week.

**In the home.** Consciously change the way you eat this week. Eat less food and avoid your favorite beverages. When you feel hungry or a desire for a drink, think about how God is calling you.

**In the workplace or in school.** Organize a food drive to feed the hungry in your community. People are hungry all year long, not just during the holidays.

**In the community.** Make a significant contribution of your time and money to feed those in need. Whatever you give, see it as an act of thanksgiving for God's gifts to you.



## Meditation Moment

A scene in the film *American Anthem* shows a young man who can't accept the fact that he lost a leg in an accident. He draws the blinds of his room, lets nobody in, and passes his time in darkness, listening to music. Contrast this scene with another scene reported by Robert Bruce. Walking along a crowded street, Bruce heard someone singing joyfully. When he located the source, he couldn't believe his eyes. It was a legless man, pushing himself along in a wheelchair. One person's rejection of a cross brought sadness; the other's acceptance of it brought joy.

## Profile in Faith

### Cyril of Alexandria

Cyril of Alexandria (376–444) was the bishop of the Church in the powerful city of Alexandria, Egypt during a time of great turmoil. Cyril's belief in the divinity of Jesus and in Mary as the Mother of God shapes Catholic belief even today. His feast day is June 27.
